

## In Honor Of



Robert Benjamin Greenblatt, M.D.  
U.S. Navy, Commander

Robert Benjamin Greenblatt, M.D., as a Medical College of Georgia faculty member, volunteered in 1942 for military service.

His first assignment was to quell a venereal disease epidemic spreading among sailors in Savannah, Georgia. While there, his novel use of tetracycline eradicated granuloma inguinale, for which he was later awarded the Crawford Long Gold Medal. He was then assigned to the military project at Hot Springs, Arkansas to help develop mass production of penicillin for battlefield use.

At the rank of Commander, U.S. Pacific Fleet, Greenblatt took part in the invasion of Okinawa, where his ship was hit and severely damaged by kamikaze pilots. He then commanded a beachhead triage unit. Following the Okinawa campaign, his squadron (Trans Ron 12, U.S. Pacific Fleet) landed the Marines at Nagasaki and he, with others, was among the first scientists to inspect the medical effects of the atomic bomb. He was honorably discharged at the end of 1945.

CAPT Neese is currently serving a 12-month deployment in Afghanistan, for which he volunteered, as the leader of a task force whose mission is to mitigate improvised explosive device (IED) risk to American and allied forces; and to neutralize IED emplacers.

Tre is due back in the USA July 2010, and his family can't wait to welcome him home.
